

Part 2: Article

Task overview

You choose **one** of the tasks in Part 2. You can choose **either** an article **or** a story. For an article, you read a notice from a magazine or website asking for articles. The notice gives the topic of the article and includes some questions. You write your article on that topic. You have to answer the questions and write about 100 words.

Tell us about a restaurant you have been to in your town or city.


What was good about it?

Tell us about a good day out that you have had and what made it so special.

Write an article answering these questions and we will publish the most interesting articles in our magazine.

Write your article in about 100 words.

Exam help

- Read the task carefully so that you understand what you need to write.
 Think about who is going to read your article.
- Answer all the questions in the task.
- Use connectors (e.g. but, so, because, either, or) to link your ideas.
- Use adjectives to make your writing more interesting.
- When you are describing something, give positive and negative points about it.
- You can start with an opening question, to interest your readers.
- Invite other people to give their opinions.
- Write about 100 words. Check your work for grammar or spelling mistakes.
